The Camden County Commission met with Presiding Commissioner Ike Skelton, First District Commissioner James Gohagan and Second District Commissioner Steve Dougan.

## **Meeting Agenda**

Commissioner Skelton amended the agenda to include discussion of a county-wide burn ban requested by the county's EMA Director and Mid-County Fire Chief. Commissioner Dougan made a motion to approve today's amended agenda. Commissioner Gohagan seconded the motion. The motion passed by vote: Commissioner Dougan (aye) and Commissioner Gohagan (aye). Session opened at 10:01 A.M.

## **Prior Minutes**

Commissioner Dougan made a motion to approve March 11, 2025 meeting minutes. Commissioner Gohagan seconded the motion. The motion passed by vote: Commissioner Dougan (aye) and Commissioner Gohagan (aye).

## New Business

Discuss Ordering County-wide Burn Ban- EMA Director John Scheper and Mid-County Fire Chief Scott Frandsen were present to discuss the recent fire events that destroyed many homes, structures, and property around Camden County on Friday, March 14, 2025. Wind speed is expected to be a continuous problem in the area for the predictable future, grass and fields are very dry due to snow and ice creating more nitrogen, and a fire moving at the speed of the wind is impossible to get in front of or chase down—per Chief Frandsen. Both parties requested the commission consider ordering a county-wide burn ban until at least April 1, 2025. Commissioner Skelton made a motion to create a burn ban order effective immediately through April 1, 2025 when the Commission will review;

the burn ban will be county-wide and, upon conviction, carry the penalty of a class A misdemeanor. Commissioner Dougan seconded the motion. The motion passed by vote: Commissioner Skelton (aye) and Commissioner Dougan (aye).

## BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY COMMISSION OF CAMDEN COUNTY, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, the County Commission of Camden County, Missouri, is authorized to enact Orders to promote and enhance the public health, safety and general welfare of individuals within Camden County, Missouri; and

WHEREAS, Missouri Revised Statute Section 49.266 authorizes the enactment of a County-wide ban of open fires pursuant to the provisions of that Statute;

- It shall be unlawful to knowingly start, initiate, cause, permit, or conduct a fire on property located in Camden County, Missouri, excluding outdoor grills utilized for cooking purposes.
- Violation of this Order shall be a Class A misdemeanor as defined by State Law. Each violation of an open burning ban imposed under this Order shall be considered a separate offense for each day or part of the day in which the violation is committed.
- 3. State agencies responsible for fire management or fire suppression activities shall not be subject to the provisions of this Order.
- 4. This Order shall not affect the ability of an individual, organization, or corporation to sell fireworks during the period of a burn ban, but it does prohibit the usage of all missile and skyrocket devices.
- The burn ban imposed under this Order shall remain in effect until 5 p.m. on Tuesday, April 1, 2025. However, the Camden County Commission may extend or rescind the ban if necessary.
- This Order and any burn ban when enacted shall be applicable to all
  unincorporated areas of Camden County, Missouri, and all incorporated
  areas within Camden County that do not have a municipal ordinance
  banning open burning.

7. Burn ban violators will be subject to a minimum fine of \$250.00 up to the maximum allowed by a class A misdemeanor. Additionally, restitution for services provided will be awarded to the responding fire department(s).

This Order shall be in full force and in effect from and after its passage and adoption. Should any provision within the Order be adjudged invalid, said determination shall not affect the validity of the balance of this Order.

**Budget Amendment for Purchasing Dept. - \$53.70- (reimbursement from MU Extension for supplies)-** Commissioner Gohagan made a motion to approve the budget amendment for \$53.70 received by MU Extension for supply purchases from the county purchasing department. Commissioner Dougan seconded the motion. The motion passed by vote: Commissioner Gohagan (aye) and Commissioner Dougan (aye).

Review/adopt changes to Purchase Order (PO) policy in Accounting Policies/Procedures Manual- The Auditor wishes to implement a new policy requiring Purchase Orders to be submitted and approved before any purchases over \$3,000.00 can be made in the BS&A Accounting Software. This discussion led

to discussion over many policies stated in the manual that some question the validity of or whether the offices enforce the policy. Jenny Wall provided the commission with a red-line version of the policy that she and another person worked on together and requested the commission read over it and consider adopting the changes. The Auditor submitted the following revisions to the policy:

## 1-102 Application.

This Policy applies to contracts for the procurement of equipment, supplies and services entered into by the County after the effective date of this Policy, unless existing contracts were entered into prior to the effective date. It shall apply to every expenditure of public funds by all Administrative Authorities and the Purchasing Department irrespective of the source of the funds. When the procurement involves the expenditure of federal assistance or contract funds, the procurement shall be conducted in accordance with any mandatory applicable federal law and regulations. Nothing in this Policy shall prevent any public agency from complying with terms and conditions of any grant, gift, or bequest that is otherwise consistent with law. All purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 shall comply with state statute as defined in this policy. A Purchase Order (PO) will be required on any item or project that is projected to exceed \$3,000.00. A PO is required before the purchase is made (including purchases on credit cards) or the project start date.

Exceptions to PO requirements: utilities (phone, electric, propane, etc.), Road and Bridge regular expenditures (fuel, rock/chat, salt asphalt, etc.).

Commissioner Gohagan made a motion to adopt the changes to the Purchase Order Policy proposed by the Camden County Auditor. Commissioner Dougan seconded the motion. The motion passed by vote: Commissioner Gohagan (aye) and Commissioner Dougan (aye).

Read/review/edit- Accounting Policies and Procedures Manual- The County Auditor was out of the office today. Commissioner Skelton motioned to table this item on the agenda. Commissioner Dougan seconded the motion. The motion passed by vote: Commissioner Skelton (aye) and Commissioner Dougan (aye).

**Adjourn:** With no further official business on the agenda, Commissioner Gohagan made a motion to adjourn to any unofficial business that may develop during the day. Commissioner Dougan seconded the motion. The motion passed by vote: Commissioner Gohagan (aye) and Commissioner Dougan (aye). Session closed at 11:37 A.M.



3. Situation Summary	HICS 201	

Friday, March 14<sup>th</sup>, was a historic day for Camden County with a major outbreak of fires throughout. These fires were fanned by extremely strong winds with some gusts exceeding 60mph. County Fire Agencies responded to a record number of calls during the event. Due to the efforts of firefighters many residential and commercial properties were saved. There were no deaths reported and there were no significant injuries. Several firefighters were treated for minor injuries but none required transport. Due to the overwhelming number and size of the fires, Region F Fire Mutual Aid Coordinator Scott Frandsen requested mutual aid from local agencies as well as agencies for throughout mid-Missouri for assistance.



During the ongoing wildfires in Camden County, Missouri, which led to significant property damage and evacuations already, it is crucial for wildland firefighting teams to adhere to established safety protocols. Firefighters should remain vigilant about current fire weather conditions, ensuring they are informed of forecasts and any active burn bans. When engaging in outdoor burning, always check local weather conditions, avoid low humidity and windy days, and consult with local fire departments regarding burn bans.

Additionally, the Ten Standard Firefighting Orders provide a foundational framework for safe firefighting practices. These orders emphasize the importance of understanding fire behavior, establishing clear communication, and identifying escape routes and safety zones. They also highlight the necessity of maintaining control over firefighting forces and making safety the top priority. By incorporating these guidelines into daily operations, firefighting teams can enhance their safety and effectiveness in wildfire suppression efforts.






## RH and Wind Gust Today





**Maximum Wind Gust Forecast Wednesday** 




